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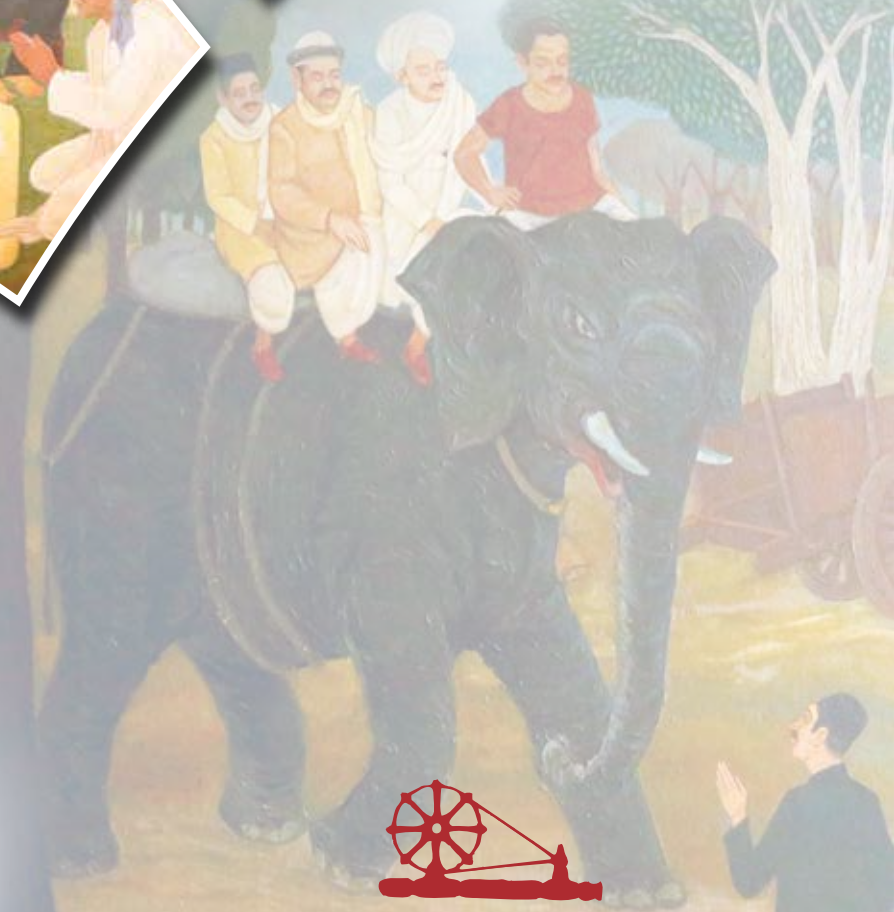

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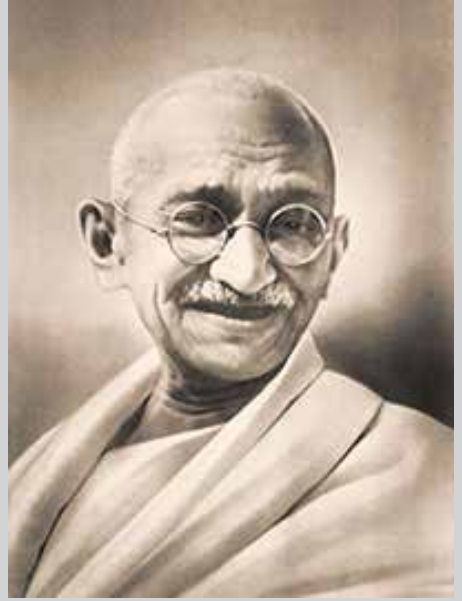

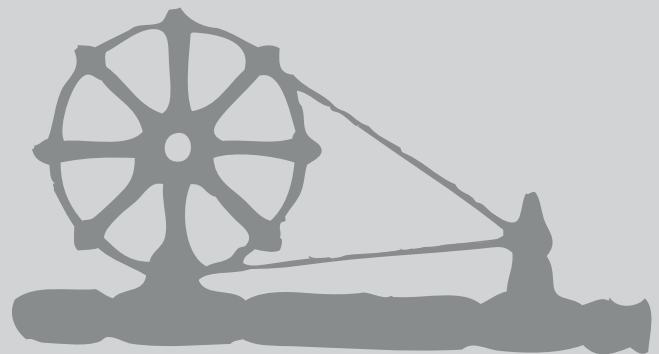


Route Map of Champaran

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Foreword

Champaran and Mahatma Gandhi

Friends,

Nation is gearing up for the centenary celebrations in 2017 of the first mass movement launched by Gandhiji in India.

There have been peasant movements before and after the Champaran movement of 1917, but what makes Gandhi's Champaran Satyagraha – significant is the fact that it was the first time that bridges had been built between the peasants and the other sections, especially the middle class intelligentsia. In addition, while the final resolution addressed the peasants' grievances only partially, the idea that the mighty Britishers could be forced to bend -caught the imagination of the thousands of Indians fighting for freedom. From now on, people began to defy as well as challenge the injustices.

A question is often asked:

"Whether Champaran Satyagraha launched Gandhiji in Indian politics or Gandhiji launched Champaran Satyagraha." Whatever the answer is, it remains a fact that Gandhiji made his debut in Indian politics with the Champaran Satyagraha. In the words of Dr. Rajendra Prasad, "Through Champaran Satyagraha, Gandhiji taught the simple and illiterate mass of Champaran -the lesson of truth and non-violence, not by speeches but by his action".

One could argue that though the Champaran Satyagraha led by Gandhiji did not produce a constitutional change, it demonstrated that ordinary Indians had the power to drive events. Satyagraha succeeded in weakening the forcefully imposed/established structures. Champaran movement did not begin as an act of defiance; it was an effort to remove the distress of poor peasants. In the early 19th century, European planters had set up indigo farms and factories at Champaran, in North Bihar. Thereafter, they forced the local cultivators to enter into the tinkathia system, which stipulated 3/20th of their holdings

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(usually the most fertile part of the land) be reserved for indigo cultivation. Moreover, the peasants were compelled to sell their crop at a extremely predetermined low price. When the demand for indigo in the global market began to fall with the arrival of German synthetic dyes, the European planters of Champaran passed the burden of losses on to the cultivators. Rents were raised and other illegal dues were extracted from them before the peasants could stop cultivating indigo.

A Champaran peasant Raj Kumar Shukla, managed to persuade Gandhiji to visit the area to fight for the rights of the exploited cultivators. Gandhi and his colleagues toured the villages, asking questions and recording statements, accounting the atrocities and terrible episodes of suffering, including the general state of degenerate living. Meanwhile, a Champaran Agrarian Committee had been formed by the Government, with Gandhiji as one of its members. Unable to ignore the statements of around 8000 peasants, the Government accepted Gandhiji's suggestion of abolishing the Tinkathia system. Furthermore, the planters were asked to refund 25% of the amount they had illegally collected from the peasants as enhancement of dues.

Champaran provided a great challenge and opportunity for Gandhiji. Gandhiji adopted a holistic approach during Champaran movement. Soon realizing that ignorance and illiteracy among the farmers had made it easy for the Britishers to exploit and repress them, Gandhiji decided to bridge the gap between education and work. He thought that it was not enough to fight against the officials and the government. The equally important task was to do something to improve the cultural and social backwardness in the Champaran villages. Building on the confidence of the villagers, he began leading the cleanup of villages, building of schools and hospitals and encouraging the village leadership to undo purdah, untouchability and suppression of

women. He appealed to his co-workers from all over the country. Several responded to his clarion call. Many young enthusiastic workers joined him in his crusade like Dr. Rajendra Prasad, J.B. Kriplani, Dr. Anugrahanarain Singh, Braj Kishore Babu, Ram Navami Prasad etc. Champaran Satyagraha went on to become the launchpad for the wider struggle for the country. Gandhiji's youngest son Devdas also joined them. Buniyadi schools were opened in six villages in Champaran where training in spinning, carpentry, farming etc. became part of the syllabus. Kasturbai taught the ashram rules on cleanliness and sanitation. Health conditions in the villages were miserable. Gandhiji got a doctor to volunteer his services for six months.

Champaran is dotted with Gandhiji's footprints in the form of institutions, buildings, memorials, etc. which needs to be conserved and preserved as they are important milestone while delineating the history of Gandhian era. From Bhitiharwa ashram, situated in the northwest corner of Bihar to Pipra Kothi at the southern edge of Champaran, the area is peppered with the places, buildings, memorials etc. which bear the Mahatma Gandhi's imprints, though most of these places are in sorry state today. Besides, the revolutionary concept of Nai Talim- amalgamating 3'R's with the compulsory physical labour has long been forgotten. Buniyadi Schools have lost mass interest in face of the challenge of globalization. However, the irony of situation is that only Gandhian scheme of things could save the Third World from the onslaught of globalization

Let us join hands and come together to save the legacy of Gandhiji's Champaran in its the centenary year.

Introduction

Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti: A Profile

Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti (GSDS) was formed in September 1984 by the merger of Gandhi Darshan at Rajghat and Gandhi Smriti, at 5, Tees January Marg as an autonomous body, and is functioning under the constructive advice and financial support from the Ministry of Culture, Government of India. The Prime Minister of India is its Chairperson and it has a nominated body of senior Gandhians and representatives of various government departments to guide it in its activities. The basic aim and objective of the Samiti is to propagate the life, mission and thought of Mahatma Gandhi through various socio-educational and cultural programmes.

The Samiti has two campuses:

(a) Gandhi Smriti

Gandhi Smriti, housed in the Old Birla House on 5, Tees January Marg, New Delhi, is the sacred place where Mahatma Gandhi's epic

life ended on 30 January 1948. Mahatma Gandhi had lived in this house from September 9, 1947 to January 30, 1948. Thus, the hallowed house treasures many memories of the last 144 days of his life. The Old Birla House was acquired by the Government of India in 1971 and was converted into a National Memorial of the Father of the Nation and was opened to the public on August 15, 1973.

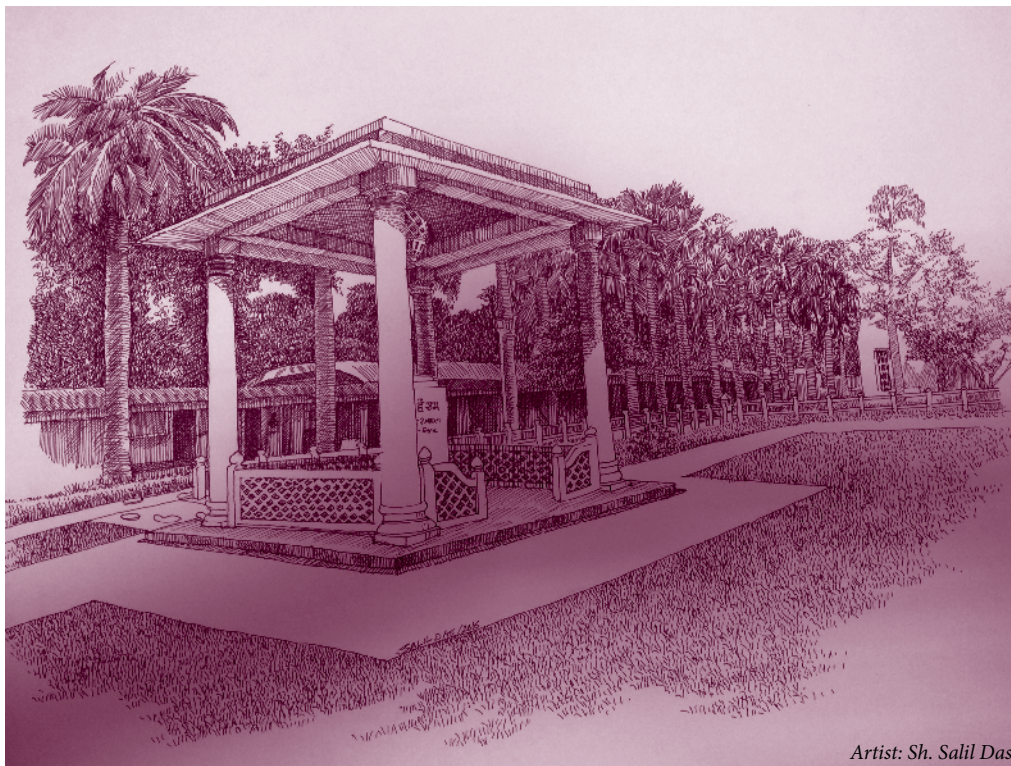
The preserves include the room where Gandhiji lived and the Prayer Ground where mass congregation used to be held. This was the place where Gandhiji was felled by the assassin's bullets. The building and the landscape have been preserved as they were in those days.

The Memorial consists of:

- (a) *Visual Aspects* to perpetuate the memory of Mahatma Gandhi and the noble ideals they represented,
- (b) *Educative Aspects* to focus concentrated attention on certain values of life that made Gandhi a Mahatma and
- (c) *Service Aspects* to introduce activities in order to sub-serve certain felt needs.

On display in the Museum are photographs, sculptures, paintings, frescos, inscriptions on rocks and relics pertaining to the years Gandhiji spent here. The meagre personal effects of Gandhiji too are carefully preserved.

The entrance gate itself is of great historical significance as it was from the top of this Gate Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru announced to the World about the passing away of Mahatma Gandhi, "... the light has gone out our lives and there is darkness everywhere..."

A larger than life statue of Mahatma Gandhi, with a boy and a girl holding a dove in their hands, standing on either side, emerging out of the globe, symbolising his universal concern for the poor and the deprived, welcomes the visitor at the main entrance of the Gandhi Smriti. It is the work of the renowned sculptor Sri Ram Sutar. The legend at the base of the sculpture says, "My Life is My Message".

A Martyr's Column stands at the spot where the Father of the Nation was assassinated, commemorating the Martyrdom of Mahatma Gandhi as the embodiment of all the sufferings and sacrifices that characterised the long struggle for India's Freedom. A broad stone pavement is laid round the Column for devotees to take a reverential *parikrama* (walk around). The wide space in front of the Column is made for devotees to offer homage. Close to the Martyr's Column on the lower lawns are the words of Gurudev Tagore, "He stopped at the threshold of every hut..."

In the Centre of the Prayer Ground, is a Pavilion with frescos on the walls, depicting the continuity of India's cultural voyage, her interaction across the globe and the emergence of Mahatma Gandhi as a 'Universal Man', embodying in his person all that is sublime in human life as he said:

'For my material needs my village is my world but for my spiritual needs the whole world is my village'.

Outside the Pavilion there is a bench, made of red sand stone on which Mahatma Gandhi used to sit during the prayer or in conversation with the vast mass of humanity who would assemble on the lawns of the Old Birla House seeking his counsel and solace in those troubled days.

The green lawns are the main feature of the Prayer Ground with peripheral decorations with flowers laid round the lawn. Near the entrance of the memorial on its right lawn is inscribed "India of Gandhi's dream". At the roundabout close to the prayer ground are the words of Albert Einstein, "Generations to come will scarce believe..." In the centre of the roundabout is a creation of the renowned artist Sankho Chowdhury in bronze, symbolising the 'Eternal Flame' lit by Gandhi with his martyrdom.

Gandhiji's Room at Gandhi Smriti has been kept exactly as it was on the day of his assassination. All his possessions are on display: his glasses, walking stick, a knife, fork and spoon, the rough stone he used instead of soap. His bed was a mattress on the floor, plain white, with a low, wooden desk by its side. There is also an old and well-used copy of the *Gita*.

The entire building is now divided into different sections. On either side of the main entrance of the building a Prayer composed by the Mahatma 'A Servants Prayer' and his eternal message, His 'Talisman' are on display.

The evolution of *Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi to Mahatma Gandhi* is depicted in the south wing through the panels of black and white photographs accompanied by a simple narrative. The south wing also houses an auditorium and a committee room.

Besides, the exhibition has been so aligned that the south wing gives a simple narration of the journey and evolution of a boy called Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi and how through his 'experiments with truth', he leads India and humanity to its emancipation.

The northern wing has five different sections. The first section, the gallery leading towards the room where Gandhiji spent the last 144 days of his life is devoted to his Peace Pilgrimage and Martyrdom. Next to this is the second section, another room with special focus on the last 48 hours of his life, which culminates with his martyrdom. This section has also an auditorium with facilities to screen films on Mahatma Gandhi.

The third section of the north wing projects the 'India of Gandhi's Dreams' and the formulae he has left behind for posterity to realise this dream: the Eighteen Point Constructive Programme. Gandhi wanted to present India as a model of development before the world with scientific precision. The epic journey ends – Father of the Nation is gone. But his legacy lives on. Above all, an unfulfilled dream remains as a challenge before us to build the 'India' of his 'dreams'.

The fourth section *Sumana* has twenty-eight enclosures/panels in all. The section, which is today, houses the Minifigures. These powerful *dioramas* depict important events in the life of Mahatma Gandhi from his boyhood to his martyrdom. Crafted by Smt. Sushila Rajni Patel, this section of the Museum is an enriching experience.

In the fifth section *Sanmati*, the Gandhi Smriti literature centre, there is a vast collection of *Gandhiana* and other related and relevant books available under one roof.

A special section is devoted to explain how the world reveres Mahatma Gandhi. The first part is through the eyes of the artists reflecting the magnificent life of the Mahatma. The second part is Gandhi on himself.

In the centre, people are led to assimilate, absorb and feel the presence of the Mahatma through a 40 second multi-media animation, depicting the last journey of the Father of the Nation towards his Martyrdom. This is depicted through the rendition by one of the renowned vocalists Kumar Gandharva.

The *pergola* – which provides an interface with the visiting mass of humanity –is now a walking art gallery, which provides an opportunity to artists from all segments of our society and all parts of the world to witness the journey of Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi to Mahatma Gandhi in the sprawling exhibition *From Mohan to Mahatma* prepared by senior Gandhians like Shri Anupam Misra and developed by the National Archives of India. The exhibition was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Minister of Culture and VC GSDS Dr. Mahesh Sharma on the occasion of Gandhi Jayanti on October 2, 2015 in Gandhi Smriti.

by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India after being received from the World Peace Gong Committee of Indonesia was inaugurated at a special function commemorating the 100 years of Satyagraha on September 11, 2006. This is a gentle reminder to the world of the enormous struggles by peace marchers across the world to live in harmony with one another.

From here the visitors are guided into the room where Bapuji spent the last 144 days of his life. As they come out of this room they are acquainted with history of these 144 days through the Photo Exhibition accompanied by narratives culled out from the accounts of the eye witnesses.

Swaraj at Gandhi Smriti showcases Gandhian emphasis on khadi, cottage industries and rural development.

The *Kirti Mandap* pandal christened by the eminent *Sarod* Player Ustad Amjad Ali Khan,

While on their journey, the visitors also witness the magnificent World Peace Gong that stands facing the roof top where the mortal remains of the Father of the Nation was kept on January 31, 1948 for thousands of people to pay their last tributes. The Peace Gong, gifted to Gandhi Smriti

near the Martyr's Column at Gandhi Smriti has the capacity to accommodate 500 participants for major programmes.

In an endeavour to provide the underprivileged section of the society skills in

computer, stitching and embroidery, early childhood care and education, community health, spinning and weaving, mime and music, *Srijan* – the *Gandhi Smriti Educational Centre* – is also functioning here. *Srijan* aims to help them learn these vocational courses in order to instill in them appreciation for self-help, confidence and bread-labour.

The museum added in April 2005 a multimedia exhibition entitled *Eternal Gandhi*, which is housed on the entire first floor of the building. It has used state-of-the-art electronic hardware and new media to bring Gandhiji's life and vision alive. The approach has been both historical and interpretative. This exhibition using 21st century technology highlights the core of Gandhian thought – the commitment of a Satyagrahi to the principles of truth. Two sculptures of Ba and Bapu made in rganized, which are the creations of a couple, Mr. Decha Saisomboon and Mrs. Wipa Saisomboon from Thailand, are also kept at the multi-media museum.

It is these components that together make Gandhi Smriti a *Composite Museum*.

(b) Gandhi Darshan, Rajghat

The second campus is situated adjacent to the Mahatma Gandhi Samadhi at Rajghat.

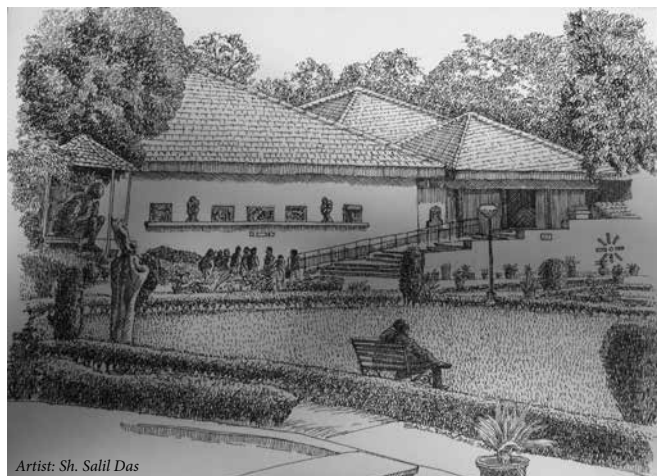
It was twenty-one years after the Mahatma's martyrdom that the whole world decided to observe his centenary in 1969 in a way worthy of the Pilgrim of Peace. It was then the sprawling thirty-six acre campus came into existence to mark the centenary of Mahatma Gandhi. Thirteen Indian states and seven foreign countries had joined hands in creating

the magic, called the *Gandhi Darshan International Exhibition*. The main objective of the exhibition was the interpretation of Gandhi's message and gospel of truth and non-violence against the background of the modern world and the way it has permeated and affected the nation's life and influenced the other countries of the modern world.

Today two exhibitions exist in Gandhi Darshan- *My Life is My Message* and *Freedom Struggle* in clay models.

In the first pavilion entitled ***My Life is My Message***, hundreds of archival photographs have been arranged on the walls, along with brief textual narratives. Some of these images of Gandhiji as a child and young man are rarely seen. There is also a model of the house in which he was born, as well as the actual army vehicle in which his body was transported for cremation to the grounds, now known as Rajghat.

In addition, visitors can see Gandhiji's school report cards, newspaper clippings and cartoons that show contemporary reports and reviews of his activities, the letters exchanged between Gandhiji and Leo Tolstoy, portraits of his wife and parents and other fascinating material. One display showcases the many commemorative stamps issued by countries around the world in the years that followed Gandhiji's assassination; and another displays the letters that were sent to him. These, especially, reveal, how widespread was the fame that a simple Gujarati lawyer acquired in his lifetime. For example, one is addressed to 'Gandhiji: Wherever He May Be'; another (posted in New York) simply has a sketch of Gandhiji on the envelope.

To summarize, this pavilion with 274 panels has the following:

- 1) In Panel no.1-273 there are photographs on life of Gandhiji from birth till assassination, there are 1600 photographs approximately.
- 2) In Panel no. 274 there are 75 stamps from different countries, released on the centenary year of Mahatma Gandhi.
- 3) There is the boat and bench used during Salt Satyagraha and Gun Carriage which carried the mortal remains of Mahatma Gandhi from Birla House to Rajghat.
- 4) There are models of:
 Gandhiji's house at Porbandar in Gujarat
 Sabarmati Ashram
 Yervada Jail

The pavilion on **Freedom Struggle** comprises of beautiful clay models on different aspects of the freedom movement.

In 1994, during the 125th Birth Anniversary of Gandhiji, while addressing the nation Prime Minister Shri P. V. Narasimha Rao formally announced the setting up of *International Centre of Gandhian Studies* at Gandhi Darshan, Rajghat. On January 30, 2000, President K. R. Narayanan unveiled a Column declaring the entire Campus as the International Centre of Gandhian Studies and Peace Research in the presence of Prime Minister and Chairman of the GSDS, Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayee and several other dignitaries.

10. To restore, protect and manage both the complexes at Gandhi Darshan and Gandhi Smriti and all movable and immovable properties therein according to requirement.
11. To bring publication for various sections of people to enhance their knowledge about Mahatma Gandhi and the values he propagated.
12. To conduct inter-disciplinary research on Gandhian philosophy in the context of contemporary issues.
13. Encourage and promote Gandhian perspectives on education and facilitate education for peace, ecological security, equality and justice.
14. To work extensively with different Universities and Academic Institutions for better and in-depth understanding of Mahatma Gandhi and Gandhian philosophy.
15. Empowerment of the weaker sections of the society through vocational training programmes and other livelihood initiatives as part of Gandhian constructive work.
16. Respond and work to address challenging problems of the society.
17. Involving different stakeholders to work for a culture of collective living, collective working, peace and nonviolence.
18. Reaching the unreached with the life and message of Mahatma Gandhi especially in far flung areas.
19. To undertake such other activities and to do all the foregoing mandate and to cooperate and seek cooperation from other institutions for the aforesaid purposes.

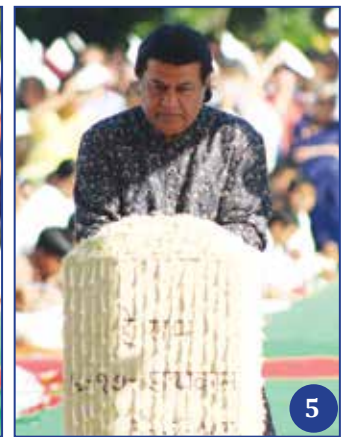

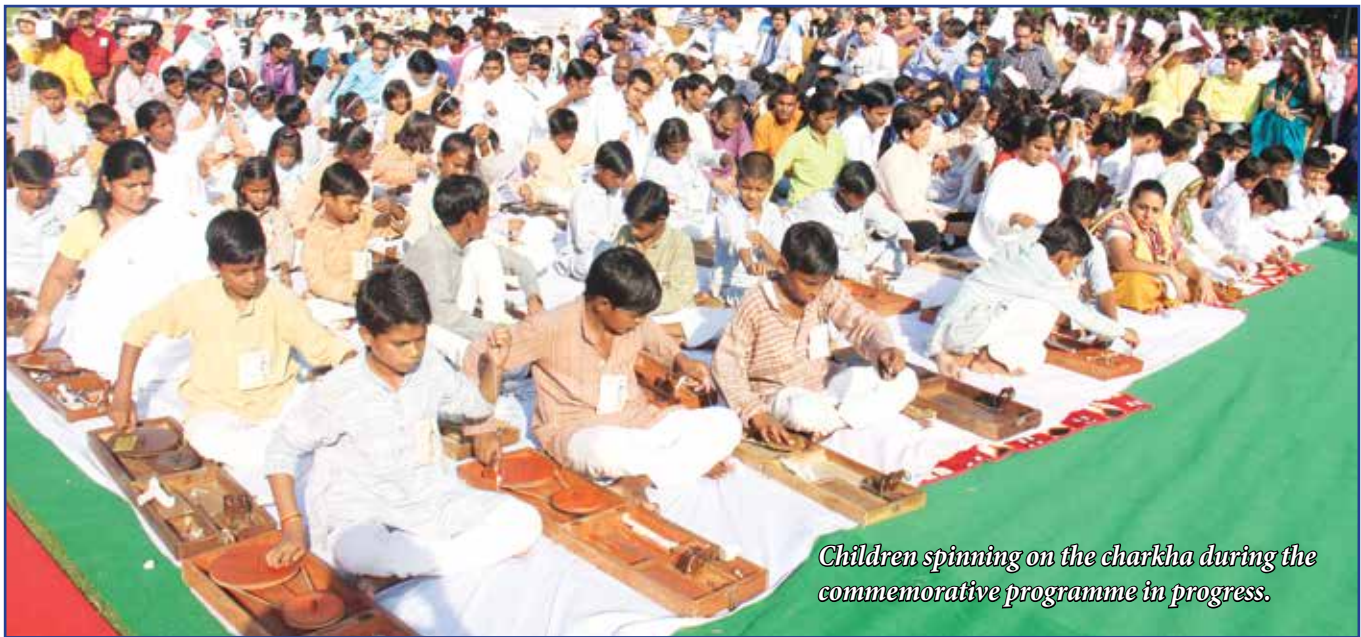
Tributes to Mahatma Gandhi

This year, there were over 350 children from 14 different institutions who joined in a harmonious melody of songs, as a tribute to their dearest Bapuji. They sang compositions of Pt. Significant Initiatives

Launch of Interpretation Center at Varanasi

A project of establishing an Interpretation Center in the selected educational institutions of Varanasi on luminaries and different cultural themes of Varanasi was envisaged and initiated by Ministry of Culture in January 2015.

The main objectives of these Centers are:

(1) To bring the activities of these Centers in the tourism calendar of Varanasi.



(2) Interpretation Centers should simultaneously provide an opportunity for conducting talent search for professional tour guides and related areas amongst the younger generation of Varanasi, hence relating these initiations leading to job creation and professional development of skills.

The Samiti was assigned to set up an Interpretation Centre at **Kasturba Gandhi Mahila Vidyapeeth, Sewapuri, Varanasi**. After discussions with the officials of the Vidyapeeth, a detailed module on the dissemination of Mahatma Gandhi's message among the students was worked out. This included a permanent exhibition on Gandhiji, enriching school library, workshops with students development of school theatre group, development of radio drama, to organize training programmes in vocations like paper work, tailoring, food preservation etc.

A team from Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti went to Varanasi to develop a museum corner in the Interpretation Centre at Kasturba Balika Vidyalaya Vidyapeeth. The Museum corner that was set up had small exhibition panels, photographs, resource material like books, cds etc. As requested by the Principal of the College, the Samiti would also provide for infrastructural facilities like almirahs, table, chairs, mike, computers etc. to the Centre.

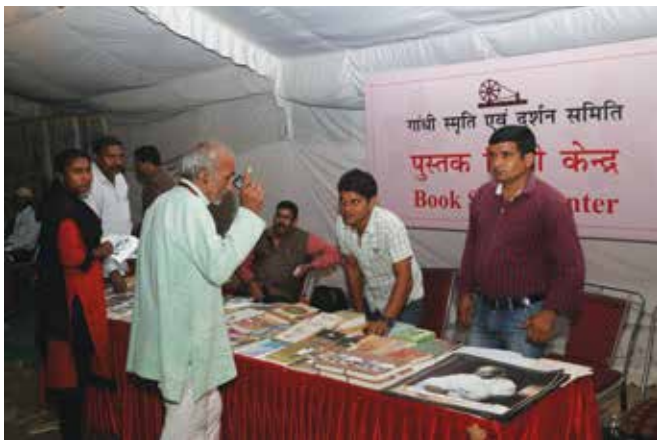
The conference also witnessed various cultural presentations by the representatives of the participating states highlighting the cultural diversity of our country.

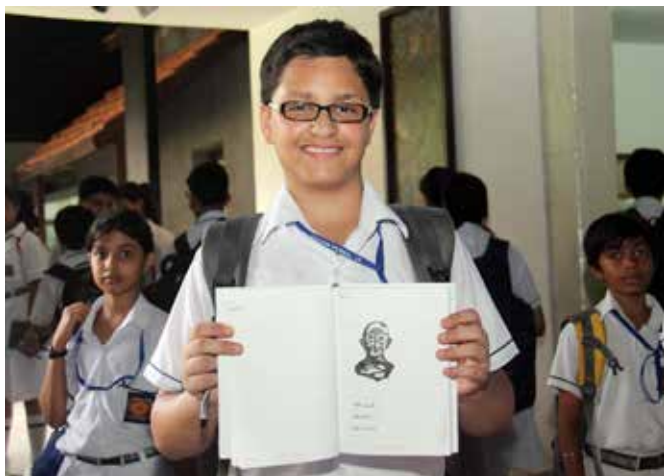
The children also tried their hands at the spinning wheel (charkha) as part of the workshop. Ms. Renu and Mr. Dharamraj explained the children

The discussion was led by the Librarian of the Samiti, Mrs. Shashwati Jhalani. The interaction was based on the role of the 1857 events leading to the independence achieved in 1947 under the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi. The children also collected materials for their school project, on 1857 as a catalyst for the freedom struggle leading to the nation's independence.

Role of Children and Youth in Peace-building: A workshop

In continuation to the endeavor of GSDS to acquaint students on the values and ideals of Mahatma Gandhi and prepare them to contribute to peace initiatives, a workshop was organized for students of St. Teresa School on July 25, 2015 in Gandhi Darshan. About 50 students took part in this workshop.

The students were taken round the First Pavilion in Gandhi Darshan. During an interactive session students were told about the importance of peace and nonviolence and the Gandhian perspectives to this. They were told about the importance of co-existence in their daily lives.

They were informed about Mahatma Gandhi's views on the essence of compassion and love for all. He had said ill-will, anger and hate will not be able to bring any peace in the society. Every effort

should be made to make peace real and tangible in the daily existence of every individual in the society.

During the discussion it was further pointed out that there could be situation of conflicts in homes, schools, colleges, workplaces, institutions and communities. In all such situations with practical knowledge and understanding of the dynamics of peacebuilding everyone can play the role of a peace-builder. Peace-building, hence should be seen as an essential component of life skill education.

Bapu had visualized the importance of preparing young people to address conflicts and be the change agents to further a culture of peace.

The students gave their views on how they could resolve conflicts within their schools, homes and within friends. Differences should be resolved so that peace can be promoted, it was felt.

Value Creation Camp organized

Programmes for Youth

Change Festival brings in a festival of change

A forum of sharing ideas, experiment and initiatives

Youth Alliance, in collaboration with Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti organised the *Change Festival* – an exploration and celebration of ideas and people driving change – in Gandhi Darshan from April 3-5, 2015. In its first residential gathering of 120 people from over 17 states across the country, it brought together all the stakeholders of a ‘university ecosystem’ – be it students, alumni, parents, teachers, funders, decision makers and others, as one community. They, as a collective, envisioned a novel university ecosystem that encouraged learning by doing and nurtured enterprises that brought about inner transformation within all those involved. It also provided a space to celebrate the actions of development that are taking place at a global level.

The working module that was adopted was:

Creating a ‘community’ based on certain values

Sharing ‘story of Change Festival’ and the larger purpose

Creating Space for participant to ‘present ideas’

Letting Ideas emerge from ‘realm of Self to Community’ becoming *circles of practice*

‘Collaborative Nurturing’ i.e. group exercises, start-ups, team work, etc.

Learning Circles

Reaping the ‘harvests, offering support and celebration’.

The discussion largely focussed on the following principles:

- i. Creating foundation for feeling of community (shared ownership)
- ii. Building up a relationship with ‘individuals’ and ‘society’
- iii. Talking about inner transformation as the focus of enterprise
- iv. Connecting ‘gifts to relationships to enterprise’
- v. Talking about collaboration and its significance in the ecosystem of love, empathy and trust
- vi. ‘Gift Economy’ and ‘Multiple forms of Capital’.

The mentors during the Change Festival were:

- i. Mr. Deven Shah, the leader of two experimental projects: *WikiPaisa.com* (a collaborative platform to make money simple and life happy) and *StartupKindness.org* (an initiative to facilitate and multiply acts of generosity in the entrepreneurial ecosystem presently creating safe spaces for entrepreneurs to support each other).
- ii. Mr. Ravi Gulati, the founder Director of *Manzil*, (a non-profit organization providing a community and resources for local youth from low-income backgrounds to learn, teach, be creative, and see the world in new ways).
- iii. Mr. Vivek Sharma, (the founding member of *Kaivalya Education Foundation*, a social change organization working in the field of education in India. KEF's intervention started in 2008 with the focus to transform the quality of education in public schools by providing leadership training to school principals. Since then, we have partnered with many government, private, and educational institutions to impact more than 1235 schools in three states of Rajasthan, Gujarat, and Maharashtra).
- iv. Mr. Anshu Gupta, the founder of *Goonj* (a non-governmental organisation based in Delhi, which works in 21 states across India in disaster relief, humanitarian aid and community development. Established in 1999, has converted 1,000 tonnes of used clothes, household goods and other urban discards into usable resources for the poor. It collects and delivers 1,000 tons of material every year through a network of 500 volunteers and 250 partners).

During the two-day interactive session, about 24 teams shared their ideas and start-ups with the collective, out of which ten ideas emerged for the gathering to brainstorm on further issues, in terms of how to strengthen and take it forward around four major values – from *transaction to trust; from consumption to contribution; from scarcity to abundance and from isolation to community* – all based on the concept of 'gift economy'.

One of the points where the discussion focussed was on the whole concept of 'Gift Economy', where goods and services are given without any strings attached – an economic system in which the circulation of the gifts within the community leads to increase i.e. increase in connections, relationship strength, etc, thereby showing/projecting a shift from consumption to contribution, transaction to trust, scarcity to abundance and isolation to community. This idea was mooted on the concept of 'Giving In Full Trust' (GIFT).

The participants acknowledged the sheer beauty and humility of this system. For them, living gift-economy is to first become aware of that kindness and express gratitude.

They also discussed the various forms of 'Capital' which they elaborated as – *intellectual, spiritual, social, material, financial, living, cultural and experiential*. These were further expanded into eight forms of currency, each having its own different characteristics.

The festival created a learning community by exploring and understanding individuals who are engaged in transformational experiments and strengthening them with multiple forms of capital on the dual focus – along with the intention to impact the outer world, it focussed on the inner transformation of 'doers'.

Change Festival helped me to further enhance my understanding on larger purpose of self and together as a society. I realised that we as a single individual is not exclusive to group of people and society as a whole. The whole concept of CF that revolved around inward looking and questioning the "Why" was a very meaningful.

The discussion started on the nature of contemporary conflicts and their impact on the society. This was linked to Mahatma Gandhi's notion of resolving conflicts through non-violent action. There was discussion on how Bapu used non-violent means to help resolve contentious issues.

Place where elderly are not respected is doomed to suffer: Rajnath Singh

pan India health awareness campaign to promote active aging in Gandhi Darshan on January 17, 2016 at a special function. The Programme was organised by Healthy Aging India in association with the GSDS, All India Institute of Medical Sciences and the Times Foundation. Almost 500 people from different walks of life took part in the programme. Among those present on the occasion were Dr. Prasun Chatterjee, Shri Harshvardhan Ojha, Prof. Dr. A B Dey.

Reiterating the value-systems that entrusts us with the responsibility towards the elderly people or senior citizens, Hon'ble Union Home Minister, Shri Rajnath Singh said, "A place where the elderly are not respected is doomed to suffer and even God does not forgive". He added that those who mistreat or harshly behave with the aged, will suffer.

The Hon'ble Home Minister regretted that old-age homes have to be created in India to rehabilitate the aged. He also said that it was important for the country to emerge as a global teacher (vishwa guru) rather than aspiring to be a super power. Revoking the teachings from the Ramayana, Shri Rajnath Singh said that following the principles of Lord Ram is a unique quality, which everyone should learn and imbibe. Lord Ram kept his principles intact and even went for 14 years in exile to keep his father's word and respect, he asserted.

A decent, educated and developed society is expected to take care of its old people. I do not know whom to hold guilty for the loss of life values in the society... should we hold the education system responsible for it or something else...I don't know," he said and urged the youngsters and others to take inspiration from age-old Indian traditions and values, to not only help the old, but also to make the country strong in this process.

The Union Home Minister also honoured a number of old people from different walks of life on the occasion.

Sharing his views on the occasion, Dr. Prasun Chatterjee said: "This aim of the campaign is to empower the senior citizens of our country by Intergenerational bonding and by active aging with meaningful engagement". "This campaign will not only reduce the disease burden of senior citizen, it will also strengthen social and familial bondage across the generation, thereby creating a better nation", he added.

During the programme, while students of Apeejay School Faridabad gifted wheel chairs to the aged people, the students of Vasan International School launched a documentary video on the aged people titled *dada-dadi, nana nani*.

Promoting volunteerism amongst youth for constructive work and nation-building

The participants also visited the Goshala of the Kaneri Math and were mesmerized by the beauty and the vastness of the place. The Goshala is special because there are almost 50 indigenous breeds of cow. The participants also visited the Siddhagiri Museum. This visit was important because it helped the participants to learn about their culture and tradition and what they can learn from our ancestors.

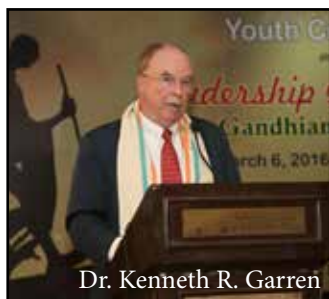

In view of this, the Samiti in association with Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan Delhi Zone organised a Youth conclave on "*Leadership Development – A Gandhian Perspective*" in Gandhi Darshan on March 6, 2016 for enhancing the qualities of the youth towards leadership development. Almost 300 participants took part in the programme.

Eminent leadership development expert, Dr. Kenneth R. Garren, who is the President of the Lynchburg College, USA, delivered the keynote address. In his address, Dr. Garren outlined the many facets and qualities of a leader. He said that while a leader has to handle adversities, he/she also has to live with these basic principles of developing a work culture, a sound character, high sense of morality and sacrifice.

While pointing out that diversity of experiences gives strength, he pointed that learning from the mistakes makes one persistent. “Anyone who wants to be a leader, must possess courage, be able to motivate others, have high ambition, energetic and the tenacity to do things”, he said. He attributed that strong communication skills are essential for becoming a good leader.

Most importantly Dr. Garren said that passion and strong conviction are important traits of a leader.

In his address, Shri Laxmi Dass, Secretary, Harijan Sevak Sangh pointed that the trend today is that everybody wants to become a leader and that people think it is easy to become one. Referring to the Gandhian leadership qualities, he said that Mahatma Gandhi led by his own example for truth and non-violence. “A leader has to first develop and then desire”, he said.

Addressing the gathering, Shri Laxmi Dass pointed out that Mahatma Gandhi surrendered everything to God after doing his duty, but also never rested till the work saw its fruition. He also spoke at length about the great communication skills of Mahatma Gandhi that could touch the hearts of millions of people. He said that even though Gandhiji spoke about multi-religion, he nevertheless read the Bhagawat Gita, which deals greatly on the principle of karmayogi and sacrifice.

Commenting that the world has moved ahead from Gandhiji’s times, Shri Laxmi Dass what Gandhiji taught was that a leader should develop an emotional connection with his/he opponents too. He told the participants that *Gandhi Vichar* (Gandhian thought) makes leaders of various types – social, political and leader of the masses.

Shri Basant Singh of Karigar Panchayat and Unnat Bharat Abhiyaan said that there needs to be continuous dialogues with the youth. He called upon the youth to develop leadership qualities and not misuse such qualities – *netagiri nahi, netretwa*

ki sadhana honi chahiye, he said.

Prof. Anand Kumar, who was the guest of honour on the occasion, dwelt on the same concept and said that as a child Mahatma Gandhi wasn’t a genius, but from failures, Mahatma Gandhi went to success. He said that the trend today and since time immemorial has been with the parents that what they couldn’t become, they would want – and often force – their children to become. Resting his hope upon the youth of today, he hoped that the sense of nationalism must not elude the youth. He reiterated that *tyag* (sacrifice), *charitra nirman* (character building) are the virtues of an able leader.

Shri Rajnish Kumar, Secretary, Gandhi Samadhi, Rajghat, pointed that leaders cannot be created, but leadership qualities can be imbibed and nurtured. He asked the youth to read more about the life’s philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi.

Earlier GSDS Director Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan in his welcome address reiterated the philosophy of leaders and visionaries which have shaped modern-day world because they thought for the welfare of humankind which is the basic traits of a good leader.

An interactive session with the participants was also conducted on the occasion. Students from the NYKS Delhi Zone – New Delhi, South, North (Alipur), East, North East (Sultanpuri), Central, South West, West and North West under the guidance and supervision of their Director Shri Apurva Shinde were felicitated on the occasion.

The workshop commenced with the introductory address by the media stalwarts like Shri Govindacharya, Shri Jawaharlal Kaul. They deliberated on the theme "**Gandhi-the Editor**". Shri Govindacharya began his address with the remark that when the contemporary media scenario is affected with the overriding role of market forces and when the media is trying to project the celebrities and models as the icons of modern society, it would

be worthwhile to visit Mahatma Gandhi's philosophy and his contribution as a journalist.

He said, "Gandhiji looked upon journalism as a means to serve people. He published no advertisement at the same time he did not want his newspapers to run at a loss. He had gained considerable experience in South Africa where he had taken over in 1904 the editorship of the *Indian Opinion* and published it in English, Tamil and Gujarati. *Young India* and *Harijan* became powerful vehicles for his views on all subjects".

Shri Jawaharlal Kaul delved into the changing facets of contemporary journalism. He lamented that the economics of present day newspapers is based on market. Market forces would decide about the stories to be included in daily newspaper, he remarked with regret.

The second session dealt with the issues of Gandhian Journalism and Role of Youth Volunteers. The key speakers were Shri N. K. Singh and Shri Ram Bahadur Rai.

Shri N. K. Singh spoke on the challenges confronting the present day young journalists. "The pressure of work from gathering, news and developing contacts is far greater than what the journalists of yesteryears had experienced", he said. He also spoke on the technological changes that have revolutionized news reporting for the print and electronic media and its influence on the people." He also spoke about the Official Secrets Act which obstructs journalists from sourcing secret documents for investigation work. "Despite

all obstructions and hinderances, there is a need for high quantity and high quality of investigation reporting.

Padmashree Shri Ram Bahadur Rai, a veteran Gandhian and journalist and Chancellor of SGT University spoke on the Gandhian vision of journalism. He said that apart from being a national leader and social reformer, Mahatma Gandhi was a great communicator, more than any one else. He recognized that communication is/was the most effective tool to shape opinion and mobilize popular support. He was successful because he had a latent skill in communication that surfaced in South Africa where he had gone initially to set up a practice as a lawyer. The practice of communication started by him in South Africa gave him the clue to rally millions of his countrymen when he returned to India.

Speaking on *Satyagraha and Media*, Shri Arvind Mohan, an accomplished journalist spoke on the role of Gandhi as communication strategist and also highlighted about his research on the Champaran Satyagraha and Mahatma Gandhi's remarkable ability to communicate with the masses in Champaran and that too in a short span of time. Practically, no newspaper was published in and around Champaran in the days. He discussed at length as to how Gandhiji was able to disseminate his message among the different ranks of Champaran peasantry, in almost 52 villages, in the absence of any established newspaper. He enumerated reasons for this – man to man contact, steadfast on truth and sincerity of purpose.

The valedictory address was given by renowned journalist Shri Awadesh Kumar who said that the society finds its echo in media presentations. Society, as well as media, does not live on separate islands. They are bound to touch by early other's perceptions.

A two-day seminar on “Gandhi, Youth Volunteerism and Constructive Work” were organised for college youth, in two colleges namely Nirmala College, Ranchi and St. Xavier's College, Ranchi by *Pratigya*, Jharkhand in collaboration with Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti on March 14-15 and March 17-17 respectively. The seminar aimed at instilling the values of 'social volunteering'

The seminar was an initiative to make inroad among college youth and guide as well as inspire them to devote certain time of theirs in an effort to bring changes in the lives of most disadvantaged and backward section of the society. This seminar aimed at creating a platform for college going youth for their learning about the hard realities of the society and vast disadvantaged section of the society. This endeavour was also targeted towards the need of facilitating them to become direct agents of change at the grassroots.

Moreover, at the time of paramount dominance of violence both at global and regional level in the form of terrorism and internal insurgency like Maoism and even increasing incidences of violence in the surroundings, it is of utmost important to take before youth the ideas and philosophy of truth, nonviolence and service to mankind enshrined by Mahatma Gandhi in more pragmatic way.

Day two began with a session on “Gandhi's concept of Social Work”, which was conducted by Dr Rashmi Mala, HOD, Department of Political Science, Nirmala College. She explained in details the Gandhian concept of social work and service to humanity. She quoted various instances from Gandhiji's life, which can be termed as milestones in the approach of social work. She outlined the teachings of Gandhi in very vivid manner with special mention of his role as social reformer and a unit of secular unity.

At St. Xaviers College, the inaugural session was graced by Prof AA Khan, Ex Vice Chancellor of Ranchi University, Mr Ajay Nath Shahdeo, Ex Deputy Mayor , Ranchi , Mr RP Singh , Special Secretary , Department of Youth Affairs, Tourism and Culture and Mr Ajay Kumar, President , Pratigya. Here too group activity formed part of the deliberations and orientation programme at the workshop.

Two sessions which saw the largest number of participation and interest were: “Pragmatic Approach to Volunteerism – Way forward” and “Gandhian Philosophy and Volunteerism”.

The students shared that they got to know so many aspects on the life and philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi for the first time. Many students shared that their idea of volunteerism completely got changed and about two third of them expressed their willingness to volunteer with *Pratigya* and similar organizations. The main theme of the seminar focused on the vision of Shri Narendra Modi, the Hon’ble Prime Minister of India to empower women in every sphere of life. About 175 people took part in the programme. Members from the Gulabi Gang (an extraordinary women’s movement formed in 2006 by Sampat Pal Devi in the Banda District of Uttar Pradesh in Northern India), advocates, people from the media, social workers, academicians, students from different institutions, women activists took part in the programme.

The members present at the inaugural session included: Director GSDS, Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan; Capt. The seminar concluded with the passing of a proposal to the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India that included 33% reservation for women in the Parliament, State Legislative Assemblies and Govt. jobs; free healthcare and legal aid for women; unique identity cards for widows & differently-abled women, special pensions for old women which can be disbursed at their door step and free hostel for them in their districts; stringent punishments for those who commit atrocities on women and debarring them from Govt. jobs and other privileges.

In Tihar

As a part of expansion programmes to take the message of Mahatma Gandhi to different sections of the society, the Samiti has been working for the welfare of the inmates in central prison Tihar, one of the largest prisons in Asia, with an aim to involve the inmates in constructive programmes through dialogue and value based programmes.

The initiative which started in 1999 was inaugurated by veteran Gandhian leader Shri Sadiq Ali. It was a small but significant step taken towards providing solace to a section of the deprived humanity.

As part of its activities, GSDS has been organizing painting competition, quiz competition, regular shramdhans (cleanliness drive) and vocational training programmes from time-to-time in Tihar.

The Samiti has been organizing various programmes with the inmates of Central Prisons in Tihar Jail.

During the year, as part of the Medical services to the inmates rendered by Dr. Manju Aggarwal in CJ 4, 5, 8, 9 over 2000 patients were treated through naturopathy and reflexology.

The Cutting and Tailoring Unit – an initiative of the GSDS in Tihar is functioning with the inmates. 10% of the total production yielded from this unit goes to the Prisoners Welfare Fund

Kargha Unit – The Kargha Unit (an initiative of the GSDS) which started during the month of July 2013 still continues to function with two Nigerians and five Indians regularly working on it.

Regular spinning, weaving and naturopathy programmes have been continuing.



• **Painting competition organized**

A competition was organized for Inmates of Central Jail no 4 Tihar on September 30, 2015 as part of the Gandhi Jayanti celebrations. The theme of the competition was the life and teachings of Gandhiji. The competition was held at ward no 13 (Vocational Centre). 46 inmates participated in the competition and used various techniques to paint Gandhiji and his teachings. Warden Sh. Amarjeet and welfare Officer Sh Zakir Hussain were present to increase the moral of inmates who participated in painting Competition.

• **Gandhi Quiz organized**

A Quiz Competition on the life and teachings of Gandhiji was organized at Ward no 13 (Vocational Centre) on September 30, 2015. The quiz was conducted by Welfare Officer Sh. - **Dandi March Trophy for Children of Chapori**

An on- the- spot painting and elocution competition on *Peaceful Environment* for the **Dandi March Trophy for Children of Chapori** was conducted by Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti in association with the Surovi Shishu Panchayat, Guwahati Assam on January 10, 2016 at Community Hall of Hajongbori Village of Chandrapur Development Block of Kamrup Metro District of Assam. The workshop was organized from February 22 to 23, 2016 by Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti, New Delhi and Kasturba Gandhi National Memorial Trust, Assam Branch aimed to promote the spirit of volunteerism amongst young women of the state.

Commemorating the 72nd death anniversary of Kasturba Gandhi, speakers at the inaugural session exhorted the young girls to take to volunteering in different issues for the development of Assam. Amongst those who were present on the occasion included senior Gandhian and Jamnalal Bajaj awardee Shakuntala Devi; Smt Damayanti Devi, Pratinidhi, Kasturba Gandhi National Memorial Trust; Smt Minoti Choudhury, Vice Chairman, KGNMT; Dr Vedabhyas Kundu, Programme Officer, Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti.

The Chief Guest at the Inaugural session, Smt Bornali Sarmah, Additional DC, Kamrup Metro stressed on the need to develop capacities of young women so that they can contribute in the development of the state. She pointed out that training programmes like these could help young women to find new avenues of skill development and understanding of issues concerning the society.

The Pratinidhi of Kasturba Gandhi National Memorial Trust, Assam Branch, Damayanti Devi, spoke of how the Trust was working for women empowerment in Assam. She felt empowering women especially young women was a priority area which needed the attention of the entire society.

He stressed upon the need for support and enhancing the marketability for women in the region to boost their income. He also shared his experiences of finding women entrepreneurs in NER more successful than male entrepreneurs in the small scale industries segment. He stressed upon the importance of association between Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) and IIE for boosting the traditional sector of the Region.

3. *Banker & women entrepreneurs Opportunities & prospect in food processing sector*
4. *Opportunities & prospects in handloom & handicraft sector*

Recommendations of the Seminar:

- i. 8 (Eight) Huts made of Cane & Bamboo (temporary structure). Each hut will have 20 stalls inside it, there will be ladder entry from the front and exit on the back and this infrastructure will be arranged in two rows.
- ii. There will be live demo of art and handloom in front of each hut.
- iii. There will be food court of each state respectively on the backyard.
- iv. An amphitheatre will showcase cultural heritage every day.
- v. There will be a training centre and an administrative building as a common facility.
- vi. Conduction of Seminars, inviting speakers from all walks of life, women achievers, entrepreneurs, technologist, social-media experts, doctors, counselors, etc.
- vii. Seminars on E-commerce, Development of Digital/ Social Media, Business Development, Entrepreneurial Skill Development & Enhancement.

• 2-day Orientation Programme on Youth in Peace-building and Skill Development

Promoting genuine youth participation in Manipur, enhancing youth engagement in governance, initiating focused training programmes in peace-building and nonviolent communication,

developing skill development programmes which helps youth to ensure sustainable livelihood and imbibing a spirit of volunteerism amongst young people so that they can contribute to community and nation building were the major highlights of the two-day orientation programme organized by Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti and Kasturba-Gandhi Institute For Development, Manipur.

The orientation programme on Youth in Peace-building and Skill Development was organized on November 26-27, 2015 at the Manipur Press Club, Meijorkhul, Imphal. About 100 youth from different districts including Imphal East, Imphal West, Bishnupur and Thoubal took part in the programme.

The participants felt in the context of the state, greater youth participation and engagement in civic issues and governance and enhancing their skills so that they can get sustainable livelihood could go a long way in ending situations of conflict in the state.

Delivering the welcome address, Dr. Oinam Sareeta Devi,

Secretary of the Kasturba Gandhi Institute for Development outlined the importance of training in peace-building and skill development for the youth of the state. She said such programmes could help create awareness amongst the youth and help them negotiate many difficult situations they may be facing in their daily lives.

Delivering the youth perspective at the inaugural session, Ningthoujam Ormila Devi, a third year Commerce student and member of The Peace Gong, Manipur, (a youth forum to facilitate dialogue amongst young people), said youth needs to take up pro-active role in solving problems in their community. In this context training in the following would be helpful: communication, understanding complex social concerns, awareness of different Government schemes and policies, which could not only help them but others, conflict resolution, leadership development, team building and group dynamics, financial management, upgradation and exposure to new skills, develop action plan for community building work.

To ensure greater youth engagement in different issues of the state, Ormila Devi suggested the need for district-wise youth policies in Manipur so that needs and special concerns of the youth in each district can be addressed effectively. There are nine districts in the state and specific youth policies on: needs of employment and entrepreneurship development, education, health, participation and spaces of opportunities can, go a long way in solving many pressing issues of the area. The overarching goal of the youth policies, she felt, should be to promote wellness and happiness amongst youth and make them realize that they have a critical role to play for the sustainable development of the state. "Ensuring sustainable livelihood for the youth of the state will go a long way in facilitating wellbeing and happiness amongst them and thereby contribute to a peaceful situation", she said.

Delivering the keynote address, Prof. Ksh. Bimola Devi of the Manipur University said, "We could contribute towards a peaceful society, only if we ourselves become a non-violent person", adding, "We have to start from our homes to learn the importance of discipline and ensure peace within ourselves". She discussed in details the Gandhian approach of ahimsa and how young people could practice it in their daily lives. We have to constantly practice to be honest, truthful, compassionate, develop empathy for others and be sincere in whatever we do. We have to be peaceful within ourselves and then contribute towards a peaceful society and nation.

Outlining the approach of Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti in its programme to train young people in peace-building, Dr. Vedabhyas Kundu, Programme Officer, GSDS said, "We have to remember that Gandhi made both the oppressor and the oppressed recognize their common humanity", and added, "For Gandhi, ahimsa was the expression of the deepest love for all humans, including one's opponents. He believed that if violence was used to achieve any end, even if it was employed in the name of justice, the result would be more devastating.

Working Session 1

To ensure that the participants got acclimatized with the programme and with each other, the game of musical chairs was played in two approaches. The first version was the traditional version and the second version was an improvisation where students were asked to accommodate people so that no one is left standing even when there is one chair left. This led to the discussion on the significance of active co-existence. Dr Kundu said active co-existence involves social interaction, the more you interact with people, and the more you co-exist. It requires actively accepting diversity and difference. It involves breaking down barriers, the outward expression of positive and negative emotional freedom and the fostering of a collaborative and empowering sense of community.

The methodology to promote active co-existence: In case of conflicts of any kind or disputes, what is important is to encourage sustained face-to-face dialogue; combined with understanding of techniques of conflict resolution, build trusts, develop long-term relationships, and contribute towards building a culture of co-existence and nonviolence.



Group presentations on different issues related to peace and conflict resolution formed an integral part of the orientation programme.

Working Session 2

In this session, Dr Sapam Dilip, Assistant Professor, LMS Law College, Imphal talked about the opportunities for young people's participation in peace building at different levels including family, youth organizations, educational institutions, community, national and global level. He also discussed the Gandhian approach to mutual co-existence and insisted why sustainable education was essential for young people. He felt sustainable skill development should be promoted so that young people can contribute to climate change and ecological security.

Day 2: November 27, 2015

Working Session 3

Prof Tomba Singh of the Commerce Department of Manipur University gave a powerful exposition on the need to promote programmes related to skill building of the youth in the state so that with opportunities of livelihood they can contribute to community and nation building. He said success does not come through magic. It needs necessary skills to succeed. This universal truth is equally applicable for the young generation. Youth energy can be the driving force for social and economic development of any country provided it is channelized effectively. Skill development and youth employment are the best means to mobilise this force, he added.

Working Session 4

Dr Vedabhyas Kundu conducted this session. Through role plays and simulation exercises, the participants were sensitized on how to be an effective communicator. The importance of active listening, being alert, how to deliver speech, dynamics of group communication, non violent communication and the Gandhian approach



to communication and putting together effective messages were discussed in this session.

On both the days adequate time was given for group work and each of the groups comprising about 10-12 participants came up sets of recommendations and suggestions. The groups included:

- I. Promoting Communication for Peace Initiatives in Manipur*
- II. Promotion of skill building and volunteerism amongst youth of Manipur*
- III. Empowerment of young women of Manipur*
- IV. Enhancing youth participation in governance*
- V. Encouraging Peace Education in Schools/ Colleges/Universities*

- **Workshop for Students to Volunteer for Constructive Work**

A two-day workshop for students to volunteer for constructive work was held in the Tripura University campus. The workshop was organised by Centre for Gandhian Studies, Department of Rural Management and Development, Tripura University and Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti, New Delhi during 12th and 13th January 2016. Overall 107 numbers of students from different departments such as Rural Management and Development, History, Forestry and Biodiversity, Economics, Sanskrit, Sociology, Law, Hindi, Information Technology, Human Physiology, IMD, Commerce, Geography, B.B.A. and B.C.A. have actively participated in the workshop.

Buniyadi Vidyalaya, Vrinadavan celebrates 77th foundation day

in the school premises. The principal of the school Shri Sashisekhar inaugurated the programme. In his address he said that it was Mahatma Gandhi's vision of self employment that led to the establishment of the Buniyadi Vidyalayas and this was the first Buniyadi Vidyalaya that was set up by Gandhiji in Chanpatia, Bihar in April 6, 1939.

It was under the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi that 53 Buniyadi Vidyalayas were established in both East and West Champaran. During the programme, students who had excelled in their classes and other extra-curricular activities were awarded. The programme was attended by over 600 people that included children and teachers.

Discussion on Save and Educate the Girl Child

The Buniyadi Vidyalaya, Brindavan, Champaran Bihar, organised a programme from May 11–13,

2015 to create awareness about *Saving and Educating the Girl Child*. The programme was attended by over 300 children mostly girls and discussed issues related to women empowerment. Many of the participants who were hearing impaired and could not speak (deaf and dumb) also displayed great enthusiasm during the programme. The chief guest on this occasion was Ms. Santubala ji, the *Patron Head* of the Kasturba Balika Vidyalaya.

The students from Buniyadi Vidyalaya also took out a rally from the school to Gandhi Ashram to spread the need for 'saving and educating the girl child'. They also did *shramdaan* on their way to the Ashram as part of the *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*. Before leaving the children paid florid tributes to Bapu.

On the next day due to earthquake, for which the programme had to be postponed, the school holidays were declared. Songs, prayer and posters on the theme were done as part of the activities.

Workshop on Fundamental Rights and their proper usage

The Samiti organised a workshop on "*Fundamental Rights and their proper usage*" in Champaran from June 8-15, 2015 with the aim to inculcate knowledge about the rights of the citizens as enshrined in the Indian Constitution. The purpose of this workshop was also to make the children aware of their responsibilities and duties as citizens and their fundamental right to vote and choose the right candidate as their representative in the Parliament. About 100 children took part in the programme.

Senior people who coordinated the workshop also briefed the children about the life's message of Mahatma Gandhi laying special emphasis upon the philosophy of truth and non-violence. Children were told that as and when they would exercise

their right to vote, they must go by their conscience, rather than fall for any sort of temptations.



As part of this workshop, children were divided into groups for conducting a ground survey and they went from one home to the other generating awareness to people about the importance of 'Aadhar Card' their 'Voter ID' and the necessity to vote. They also advised the people to get their 'Aadhar' and 'Voter ID' made.

Gandhi Quiz organised

As part of the initiative to popularise the life's message of the Father of the Nation, Mahatma Gandhi amongst school children, the Samiti initiated the Gandhi Quiz about a decade back. The aim was to help the children understand different episodes from the life of Mahatma Gandhi.

In view of this, a Gandhi Quiz competition was organised for 200 children from Class III to VIII from June 15-20, 2015 at **the Rajkiya Buniyadi Vidyalaya, Champaran**. During the quiz, children were divided into a group of three. The children were given a questionnaire. Based on this, children were selected for the first, second and third prizes respectively. It was decided that the winners would be awarded during the Independence Day celebrations on August 15, by the Bihar Government.

Workshop on Disaster Management

A workshop on *Disaster Management* was organised for **children of the Vidyalaya** from June 25-30, 2015. The workshop aimed at providing knowledge to the children on safety methods that needs to be adhered to during any form of disaster that could strike any time. The workshop – organised in view of the recent Nepal disaster – was attended by over 100 children from around the area.

Since a little knowledge and some simple precautions can help one to survive disasters, the children were given detailed information about preventive measures before as well as after earthquakes.

The following points were discussed with the children, which were followed by a mock drill. The children also visited the nearby villages and talked to people about the preventive measures.

Facts 'U' Need to Know

Before the Earthquake:

1. *Be prepared to act. Know how to act.*
2. *Identify safe places in your work area/home to 'Drop, Cover and Hold On.' Know at least two ways to exit the building safely after an earthquake.*
3. *3. Stock up on emergency supplies. Keep the basics: flashlight, first-aid kit, whistle, gloves, goggles, blankets and sturdy shoes.*
4. *Plan as if food and water may not be available for about 24 hours and other supplies for up to three days.*
5. *Always pre-arrange for safety measures. Make sure heavy materials aren't nearby.*

During an Earthquake:

1. *Remain calm as the quake occurs – others will respond to your actions. A cool head can prevent panic.*
2. *If you are indoors when the shaking occurs, stay there. Move away from windows and unsecured tall furniture. Drop, cover and hold on under a desk, a table, bed or along an interior wall. Protect your head, neck and face. Stay under cover until the shaking stops and debris settles.*
3. *If you are outdoors, move to an open area away from falling hazards such as trees, power lines, and buildings. Drop to the ground and cover your head and neck.*



After an Earthquake:

1. *Remain calm and reassuring.*
2. *Check yourself and other for injuries.*
3. *Do not move injured people unless they are in danger from any debris falling upon them.*
4. *Provide first-aid to the injured.*



Expect aftershocks.

After large earthquakes, tremors and aftershocks can continue for days.

1. Be ready to act without electricity or lights. Know how to move around the area and how to exit in the dark. Know how to access and use your emergency supplies.
2. Be aware of objects that have shifted during the quake.
3. If you must leave a building, use extreme caution. Continually assess your surroundings and be on the lookout for falling debris and other hazards.
4. Take your keys, personal items and emergency supplies with you if safe to do so.
5. Do not re-enter damaged buildings until an all-clear is given by the disaster management/rescue operations team.
6. Use telephones only to report a life-threatening emergency. Cell and hard-line phone systems normally get jammed. Therefore use text messages, since they may go through.

Group Discussion on Champaran Satyagraha

As part of the endeavor to acclimatize the school students with the Champaran Satyagraha, group discussions and interactions were organized every Saturday during July. Through the



Autobiography of Mahatma Gandhi, students were told about the life of the Mahatma. Besides, the teachers discussed about the situation

in Champaran when Mahatma Gandhi arrived there in 1917. Groups were formed to discuss different aspects of Bapu's life and the Champaran Satyagraha. Students from nearby schools would also be invited in the coming months to acquaint them with the Champaran Satyagraha.

Tributes to Dr. A P J Abdul Kalam

On July 28, 2015, a condolence meeting was organized following the demise of former President of India, Dr A P J Abdul Kalam. A photograph of Dr Kalam with group of students of the school in Gandhi Smriti was unveiled in this meeting. The students and teachers talked about the contribution of Dr Kalam and how he inspired people of India.

Other Programmes:

Several programmes that were organized during August 2015 were:

1. In the first week of August, a tree plantation drive was held in which many trees were planted by the school children and other members from the community. The Bihar Government provided many trees for plantation.
2. The school celebrated Independence Day on August 15, 2015 in which various programmes were conducted such as sports and games, cultural programmes comprising of patriotic songs and dance. The entire school staff and children celebrated the day with gaiety and fervour.
3. A sanitation drive was conducted by the school in which children cleaned up the

school as well as the surrounding areas. The Block-in-Charge, Kamlesh Kumar, the former block officer Shri Jagdish Narayan Pandey and the Village Panchayat Pramukh Shri Pradeep Thakur also participated in the drive and encouraged the children.

4. An initiative to read out the Autobiography of Mahatma Gandhi has begun on a regular basis in the school. The children are also being prepared for the Gandhi Quiz regularly.
5. Orientation programme for the children selected to participate in the Value Creation Camp and Gandhi Jayanti programme in Gandhi Smriti has begun.

Discussion on status of Buniyadi Vidyalayas in Bihar held

Director, GSDS, Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan visited both the Buniyadi Vidyalayas at Vrindaban and Sirisia at Champaran Bihar on December 16-17, 2015 along with the Programme Officer, Shri Vedabhyas Kundu. The Samiti led the discussion on the condition of the Buniyadi Vidyalayas in Champaran. Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan, assured the gathering that the Samiti would devote itself to improve the conditions of the Buniyadi Vidyalayas of the area. These were founded by Mahatma Gandhi and are based on his philosophy and principles.

Shri Gyan said that all the 24 Buniyadi Vidyalayas of the area would be holding various inter-school competitions like *Vande Mataram*, *Dandi March Rolling Trophies* and *Gandhi Quiz*, etc. Pictorial exhibition on Mahatma Gandhi's life and philosophy and a library of Gandhiana is also proposed for the Buniyadi Vidyalayas.

The meeting was attended by the local MLA Shri Prakash Rai. Teachers, parents and intellectuals who were present on the occasion, put forward their views and suggestions on the issues.

Preparations for the centenary celebrations of the Champaran Satyagraha

The Samiti held a meeting to discuss the centenary celebrations of the Champaran Satyagraha that culminates in 1917. The Director, GSDS discussed the programmes with social workers, teachers of Buniyadi Vidyalayas and political leaders to initiate the celebrations through various socio-economic and educational activities.

Brindavan Darpan Patrika (newspaper) was released on this occasion. People present at the meeting included the *gram mukhia* (village chiefs), educators, social-political worker and intellectual of the region.

The following points were discussed:

1. Request the Department of Posts to issue a special commemorative stamp.
2. Request the Hon'ble Prime Minister to release the commemorative in a major function that could be organized in Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi.
3. Keeping in mind the historical importance of the Rajkiya Buniyadi Vidyalaya, Bettiah, Champaran (being the first Buniyadi Vidyalaya started by Mahatma Gandhi in Champaran & and now has been adopted by GSDS), develop a Mahatma Gandhi Interpretation Centre in line with the Interpretation Centre started in Varanasi.
4. Develop a similar Interpretation Centre in some historical place in Motihari.
5. Map different places visited by Mahatma Gandhi during Champaran Satyagraha and prepare plans to renovate these.
6. Develop travelling exhibition for taking them to different colleges and schools of the district
7. Organize children and youth conclaves as part of the Samiti's programme on 'Volunteerism for Constructive Work' to discuss Champaran Satyagraha focusing on how they can contribute to community and nation building.
8. Organize Mahatma Gandhi Memorial Lectures focusing on lives of Rajendra Prasad, Raj Kumar Shukla etc who have been closely associated with Gandhiji during Champaran Satyagraha.
9. Organize activities to promote Swachhta Abhiyan in the region throughout the year.
10. Extension of the initiatives under Srijan-Gandhi Smriti Education and Skill Development Centre.
11. Develop a theatre on the Champaran Satyagraha and take to different places.
12. Street plays to be organized on social evils to be in consultation with the District Administration.

Preparatory meeting as a prelude to the Champaran Satyagraha

The Samiti organized a meeting at the Kumbarbagh School Brindavan to plan the programmes for the upcoming Centenary Celebrations of the Champaran Satyagraha launched in the Indian soil by Mahatma Gandhi in 1917. The main focus of the celebration is the revived and establishment of true Gram Swaraj as envisaged by Mahatma Gandhi. The Samiti was represented by Smt. Geeta Shukla., Smt. Shashwati Jhalani and Sh. Manoj Kumar at the meeting.

The members present at the meeting urged that the villages need to be made self sufficient, well educated and the Buniyadi Schools founded by Gandhiji should be made more efficient. Many teachers and principals of the Buniyadi Schools of West Champaran participated in the meeting and came up with various practical suggestions and ideas to celebrate the Centenary of Champaran Satyagraha in a begetting manner.

They stressed on providing quality education to children and requested if the Samiti could intervene towards implementation of initiatives on sanitation, health and hygiene, skill development for the villagers.

Programmes for the Tribal People

Tana Bhagats Kala Sammelan organized

Chief Minister Shri Raghubar Das on March 12, 2016 announced that the family tree (vanshawali) of Tana Bhagats will be prepared from April and camps will be organised in the villages for this purpose. He announced that special surveys will be conducted to add the names of Tana Bhagats, whose names are not in the government records.

Shri Raghubar Das was addressing almost 300 Tana Bhagats during a programme on the

“Thoughts of Gandhi – Tana Bhagat” at Vikas Bharti in the state capital as part of the programme organised by the Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti in association with Vikas Bharti on March 12-13, 2016 at Jharkhand.

During his address, the Chief Minister announced that a Tana Bhagat Welfare Board will be constituted, which will initiate an action plan for the development of Tana Bhagats in the state. He also said that the state government will facilitate the skill development to educated unemployed Tana Bhagat youths so that employment is created for them.

Apart from running residential schools for Tana Bhagats in Ranchi, Gumla, Lohardaga and Chatra districts, he announced that these schools will be renovated. The CM also announced that the Mahadani Ground of Bedo will be developed as a memorial for Mahatma Gandhi.

Addressing the gathering Shri Raghubar Das said that contribution of Tana Bhagats during the freedom movement was commendable. He assured that the state government is initiating moves to fulfil the long pending demands of Tana Bhagats and assured that many steps will be taken for the welfare of Tana Bhagats including name change of the legal heirs to their lands. Lands that had been wrongfully auctioned will be returned to the Tana Bhagats and they will be given possession of government GM land following proper verification.

The CM further said his government will strengthen the khadi institutions because Tana

Bhagats have a keen interest in khadi and are the followers of Mahatma Gandhi, who follow the path of truth and non-violence and therefore no form of injustices, should be meted to them.

The Chief Minister also felicitated the grandson of Tana Jatra Bhagat during the programme. Padmashree Shri Ashok Bhagat, MLA Shri Jitu Charan Ram, MLA Smt. Gangotri Kujur, Mayor Smt. Asha Lakra, IAS Shri K K Sone, Ms. Suchitra Sinha, director of state tourism, Dr K K Nag, Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan, Director GSDS and other dignitaries graced the occasion.

Speaking on the occasion, Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan said that present generation must know about the community who continued to upheld the lessons of Satyagraha and non-violence taught by the Mahatma and hoped that history textbooks will mention the role of Tana Bhagats in the non-violent freedom struggle, for future generation to remember their contribution.

the North Orissa University (NOU) to converge the new tribal student generation studying in the tribal, Anthropology and Department of

Also an exhibition of the traditional dresses, drums and musical instruments and their living products were at display during the programme.

The conference focused on the issues and problems of the tribals, bio diversity, livelihood, cultural convergence and challenges and the social issues like witch craft, drug abuse like Handia, and language

The chief guest in the programme was the former Chief Minister of Odisha and seven times Member of Parliament and the former Tribal Minister of Government of India, Dr. Girdhar Gamanga. Other dignitaries included: Sh. Sanada Marandi, Honorable Deputy Speaker, Odisha Assembly; Shri Basant Bhai from Karigar Panchayat; Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan, Director GSDS; Padmashree Tulasi Munda, Tribal Social Worker and Tribal Leader; Prof. Prafulla Kumar Mishra, Vice Chancellor, NOU; Prof. M. The valedictory session was organized on March 23, 2016 that was attended by Dr. Gamanga, VC of NOU and tribal leaders.

The participant Janjatis were Toto, Urao, Mech, Dukpa, Sherpa, Tamang, Lepcha, Limbu, Kambu Rai, Khas, Gurung, Newar, Bhujel etc. Among the dignitaries were Shri Bansant Singh from Karigar Panchayat/ Founder Siddagiri Karigar University, Dr Chanda Gurung, Gender Specialist, ICIMOD, Ms Yachana Rizal, Fashion Expert on Tribal handlooms/clothes and Smt. Geeta Shukla, Research Officer, GSDS. Shri A K Rai inaugurated the programme that began with an invocation by the Bhujel cultural group. Shri B K Chettri, Secretary

KKKS welcomed the participants and expressed his hope that the Sangam will bring out change in the lives of the Janjatis.

The keynote address was given by Smt Geeta Shukla, who referred to Mahatma Gandhi's vision on the tribal's socio-economic and cultural strength and that Gandhiji always upheld them for preserving their tradition. She proposed to construct a Mahatma Gandhi Statue, and hoped that a museum dedicated to hill tribes be set up.

Sri Basant Singh stressed to conserve the traditional knowledge of tribal community specially artisans. Dr Chanda Gurung mentioned the need to cope up with the changes and to protect, conserve the values nurtured by tribal womenfolk.

Miss Yachana Rizal a fashion expert who has taken the lead in promoting the tribal handlooms at Rome, said that world is recognizing the indigenous culture, especially the food, clothes and arts /crafts. She urged the tribal community to look into it and devise ways towards branding the handlooms at commercial level.

Shri A K Rai in his address hoped that the tribal communities get an international platform to not just showcase their cultural extravaganza, but they should be trained towards marketing their products. He also pleaded the different tribal communities to live in unity.

The other speakers during the Sangam were:

1. Sri Dhaniram Toto from "Toto Janjati", a vanishing tribe in India with merely 1570 Toto people living at present, stressed and urged the government to address the problem faced by Toto community;
2. Sri Sangay Dukpa, from "Dukpa Janjati" presented the case of Dukpa people along with the origins, food, arts & crafts, folk song and dance and different sustainable practices followed by the community;
3. Sri Samel Urao from "Urao Janjati" presented the Urao culture, foods and different sustainable practices followed by them;



Ethnic cultural presentations brought out the rich diversity of the tribes during the programme.

Cultural performances by different Janjati groups such as the Toto, Dupka, Urao were the highlight of the programme on the first day.

Day two, March 29, saw presentations by representatives from different tribal groups who shared the issues and concerns faced by them in their areas. The chief guest on this occasion was Swami Karyasiddheshwar Maharaj from Siddigiri Foundation. The presentations began with an invocation from the Khas Janjati. The other presentations were from: Limbu Janjati, the Tamang Janjati, the Lepcha Janjati, Khambu Raj Janjati. Newar Janjati, Bhujel Janjati.

Day three, March 30, which also was the concluding day of the three-day Sangam, began with a visit to the Lepcha Museum was organized. The day also saw the inauguration of the Siri Fest, a field event of the Sangam. (Siri, an indigenous cattle breed of Darjeeling Himalayan Region and a main economic mainstay for the hill tribes is on the verge of extinction.

Speakers present on the occasion necessitated the need for the promotion and protection of Siri cattle and development of A2 Milk and Agriculture for sustainable livelihoods of hill tribes. The speakers who included Maharajji, Shri Basant and Smt. Geeta reiterated the need for conservation and thereafter commercialization of traditional knowledge in the form of arts, crafts, food processing, handlooms, folk literature and instruments. Cultural performances by Limbu, Lepcha, Khas and Gurung Janjati were special highlight of the programme.

During the two days conference, the focus on Education as a Basic Right of Humankind and

the sub-themes related to it were dealt extensively by academics, researcher scholars and experts. All the paper presenters who spoke at the twelve sessions, in various ways dealt with the value of education in the Gandhian sense of enhancing the human capital.

The sessions were devoted to the relevance and significance of Gandhian Education in the present century, the enabling measures to make ‘Education as a basic right of humankind’ a reality, inclusive education to meet the challenges of gender and less privileged sections of society, technology in the service of education for all, the challenges confronting school education, higher education and adult education, holistic development of students through sports, music and health education, and last but not the least education for the promotion of peaceful coexistence and social harmony, factoring in the ethical problems before our present knowledge society.

The emphasis was to complement the learning of the three ‘R’s (reading, writing and arithmetic) with three ‘H’s (hand, head and heart). The core agreement underlying all the presentations was the

Darshan from November 16-17, 2015, which was attended by over 150 representatives from 80 voluntary organisations of 25 states who attended the workshop.

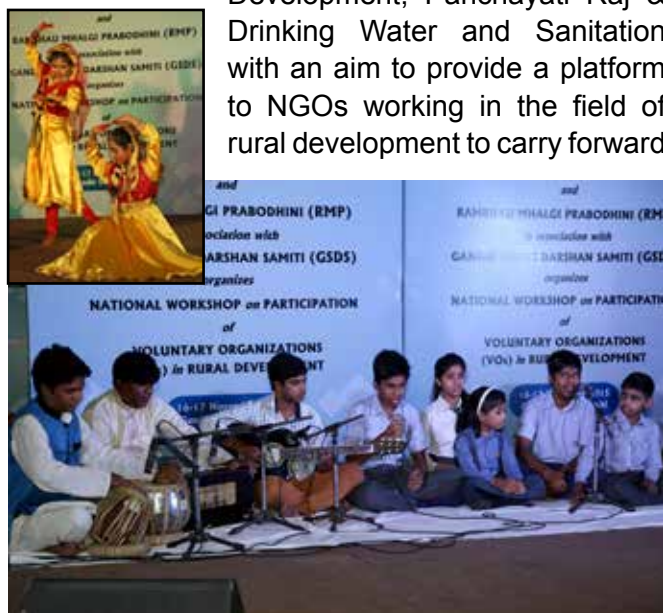

Prof. B C Nirmal, Vice-Chancellor of NUSRL and Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan, Director, Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti, New Delhi, were present on the occasion. Students of LL.B. first year, students of LL.M. final semester, Ph.D. researchers and members of the faculty, along with media fraternity were present during the programme.

Delivering the inaugural address of the two-day dialogue, Shri Amar Kumar Bauri laid stress on the powerful message of non-violence as espoused by Mahatma Gandhi and hoped that humanity lives in peace.

Dr. Jitu Charan Ram, articulated how silly reasons initiate prolonged litigation in the court and how fault-lines in the administration of justice drag the same for years and sometimes for decades. He emphasized over Gandhian values in settlements of disputes.

Shri Rajiv Ranjan spoke about plea-bargaining as a new package in criminal procedure, which was emerged from Gandhian principle of peaceful settlement of disputes.

Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan, reminded the audience on the multidimensional personality of Mahatma Gandhi. As a lawyer, Gandhi did pursue only one brief in life – that of truth and nonviolence in public life. While exploring diverse side of Gandhi as political philosopher, Sri Gyan also talked about

Earlier, delivering the welcome address, Prof. B C Nirmal, mentioned the widespread gap between legal education and law practice in India under the common law legacy. He also highlighted the inbuilt fallacy in the process of dispute settlement in the court of law. In course of his deliberation, he recalled 'Hind Swaraj', as one among the most celebrated works of Gandhiji and its contribution to value education as integral part of legal education.

Day one saw discussions on two important themes as under:

1. **Mediation and Pre-Bargaining – The Gandhian Way**, chaired by Shri Rajiv Ranjan, Chairman, Jharkhand State Bar Council.
2. **Discussion on 'Delay and Denial'**, chaired by Hon'ble Justice Vikramaditya Prasad, Retd. Judge, High Court.

Day two, February 23 began with a discussion on **Gandhian Values and Ethics**, chaired by Prof. A A Khan, Former Vice-Chancellor, Ranchi University. The other speakers included, Shri Basant, from the Karigar Panchayat, Mrs. Debjani Roy, Head of Department, Geography, Nirmala College Ranchi. Interaction with the participants on the role of Kasturba Gandhi as a symbol of women empowerment formed an integral part of this session.

The fourth session on: **Establishing a social system based on equity, justice and good conduct with reference to Gandhi's Concept of Social Justice** was chaired by Prof. (Dr.) B C Nirmal, with speakers Shri L N Bhagat, Former Vice-Chancellor, Ranchi University and Mrs. Rashmi Mala Sahu, Head of Department, Political Science, Nirmala College, Ranchi. This session gave a broad overview to the participants and inculcated the interest on the principles of Gandhiji and his way of working.

The fifth session themed on **Gandhi as an Advocate** was chaired by Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan, Director, GSDS

The chief guest of the Valedictory session was Hon'ble Justice Vikramaditya Prasad, Retd Judge, Patna High Court. The guest of honour was Shri George John, Vice-Chancellor. Present on the occasion were Prof. (Dr) B C Nirmal, Shri Dipanker Shri Gyan, Shri N D Guru. Discussion on importance of truth, non-violence and other values in present day judicial system formed the essence of the valedictory session.

Panel discussion on "A Gandhian Non-Violent movement for a non-violent culture of development"

The "Save Ganga & Save Himalaya" meeting-cum-panel discussion was organized by GSDS in collaboration with the National Women's Organization, Pune and Chinmaya Mission, New Delhi on March 12, 2016 on the occasion of the 86th Anniversary of the historic Dandi March. The

other organizers were: Ramamani B.K.S. Iyengar Yoga Institute, Pune, Ahimsa Vishwa Bharti, Delhi, Mokshada, Delhi; Khadi & Village Industries Commission Gramodyog and Viniyog Parivar, Mumbai and Sai Freight Private Ltd, Mumbai.

Sharing of ideas for saving the River Ganga came during the discussions by resource persons from different parts of the country.

Recommendations:

1. An Act is needed for National River Ganga like the National Flag Act;
2. It has to be ensured that there is zero discharge of pollution into Ganga;
3. Rejuvenating the Ganga is doing the river much healthier than making it aviral / nirmal;
4. Excessive withdrawal of groundwater lowers the water table, which reduces base flow and may even reverse the direction of flow;
5. Recharge groundwater to increase base flow in the river.
6. Only 30% of water is utilised in flood irrigation, which can be increased to 70 or 75%. This will save water, reduce demand and make water available in river. Irrigation consumes over 80% of water drawn from the river.
5. Quantity and quality have to be addressed together.
7. Pollution has converted small rivers into dirty drains. Keeping them clean will automatically clean the main river.
7. 45% of area of Delhi is unsewered, much of it is served with water.
8. Inland Navigation Act has been passed by Parliament on 09 March 2016 in less than 2 years of the formation of present government but River Regulation Zone has not been notified in more than last 10 years though encroachment on Yamuna is continuing and disaster at Kedarnath has opened everybody's eyes in June 2013.

9. We have National Environment Policy and National Water Policy. We need National River Policy. Ganga rejuvenation and creation of national waterway on Ganga are being planned as independent programmes and in some ways in conflict with each other. Policy will resolve such conflicts.
10. River development is not river bank development. River development should improve the health of the river.
11. Exploit self-purifying capacity of the river by putting treated wastewater in the rivers.
12. There is high deterioration in Ganga water quality right from Haridwar onward and that the water is totally un-potable right from Rishikesh onward. This he pointed out is also due to shortage of water.
13. We must promote dry toilet. A vacuum based system can be evolved to process the night soil which can be converted into organic manure or methane to use. Digest faeces with ash and bacteria and when container is full, transport and use as manure.
14. The Ashrams at places like Haridwar, Allahabad, Kashi and other places must treat their own sewage, besides must follow the rain water harvesting parallel to sewage management, to keep environment more eco-friendly and water recharging of soil.

Treated or untreated sewage and industrial waste must not be discharged into the rivers, and sewage must be converted into valuable manure for organic farming, which should be promoted in a massive way for decreasing the non-point sources of pollution of rivers from agricultural run-off into the rivers and also for maintaining soil fertility, checking the groundwater degradation, reducing water requirement of crops, producing health-friendly food, etc, was the firm recommendation of Save Ganga Movement and also of the Consortium of Seven IITs' Ganga River Basin Management Plan (GRMBP).

State-level Workshop on Capacity Building of Elective Representatives of Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs)

The Samiti organized a *State-level Workshop on Capacity Building of Elective Representatives of Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs)* in Uttar Pradesh in collaboration with Association of Voluntary Agencies for Rural Development (AVARD) at UP Gandhi Smarak Nidhi, Gandhi Bhawan, Lucknow.

The main objectives of the workshop included imparting up-to-date knowledge about the status of Panchayati Raj institutions in UP and specific position of women in it. Besides, making them aware of their rights and responsibilities for their active participation in the decision-making process at various levels and boosting up their confidence to play a lead role. 153 representatives of PRIs/voluntary organisations apart from some resource persons and guests took part in the programme.

The inaugural session was chaired by Shri P.M. Tripathi, President, AVARD and Shri Bharat Bhushan was guest of honour. The introduction to the workshop was given by Shri B Mishra, General Secretary AVARD.

While delivering the key note address, Shri Tripathi said that after the independence of the country one tier Gram Panchayats were introduced and 1/16th of the total land revenue received was shared with them. Referring to pre-British days he said that villages used to take up community work on their own.

In his address Shri Bharat Bhushan emphasized that women in Panchayati Raj should not be treated in isolation. He mentioned the example of the programme for empowerment of rural women being implemented by PANI in nine districts of Uttar Pradesh in which more than 6000 women are involved.

The first and second session was on ***Constitutional Position and Role of women in Restructured Panchayati Raj***. The session was chaired by Dr. Saroj Pandey.

The third working session was on ***Participation of Women in PRIs: Present Situation***. The session was chaired by Shri Bharat Bhushan.

The fourth working session was on ***Underlining the Difficulties in participation and Training Needs of Women in PRIs: Group Discussion***. Shri Devi Prasad Gupta facilitated the process of Group formation and Shri Girijesh Pandey, Shri Rajdeo Chaturvedi and Dr. Jitendra Chaturvedi facilitated discussions of one group each.

The valedictory session was co-chaired by Dr. B Mishra and Shri Sameer Banarjee. Dr. Mishra, encouraged the participants from voluntary organisations to follow-up the process of capacity building of elected representatives in their area of operation. While addressing the participants he cited the views of Jain Muni Tulsi about women. According to him women are Triveni (confluence) of Mamta (affection), Samata (equality) and Kshamata (capabilities). They should not remain only like Laxmi and Sarswati but also become Durga when needed for the good of society.

Library and Documentation

In conformity with the objective of the Samiti to organise and preserve books, photographs, films, documents, leading to better understanding of Mahatma Gandhi's work and thought, a Library and Documentation Centre has been set up.

The library has a collection of nearly 12,000 books on Gandhiji's life and thought, art, culture, history, economics, politics, religion, archaeology, including reference books, namely World Atlas, Encyclopedias and Dictionaries. There is a special section for children. It also subscribes to various journals and magazines on a regular basis and caters to the needs of scholars, research fellows and students. Many new books were added during the year.

At the Documentation Centre – an inherent part of the Library – press-clipping files are being maintained on different topics such as Gandhi, Women, Children, Youth, Crime against Women, Environment, Indo-Pak relations, Communalism, International affairs. In an effort to strengthen the Documentation Centre, several other topics have been added this year. The process of digitalization of the library is in progress.

Visit of Korean Speaker of the Assembly of the Republic of Korea to Gandhi Smriti

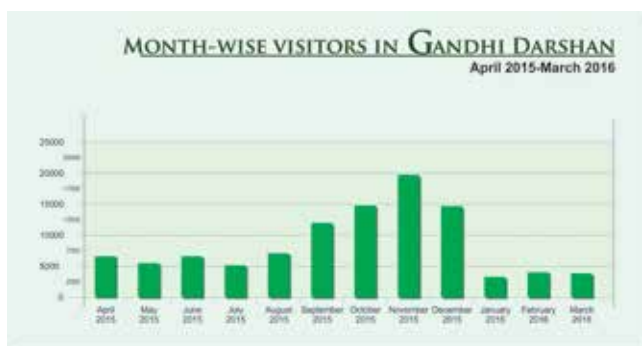
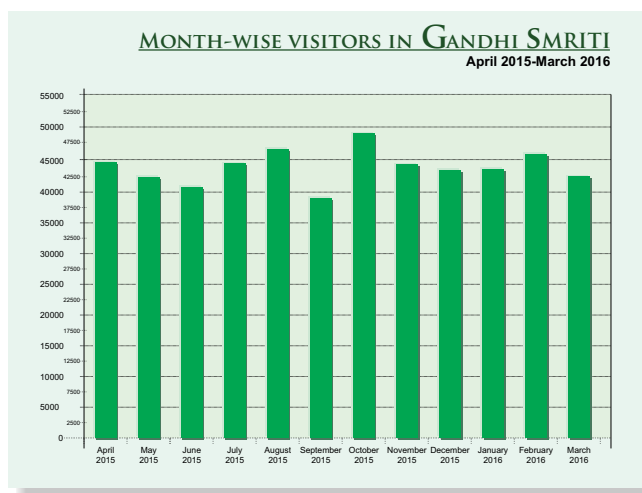

on the life and times of Mahatma Gandhi. After a prolonged illness, Shri Mahadev Bose left for his heavenly abode on February 9, 2016.

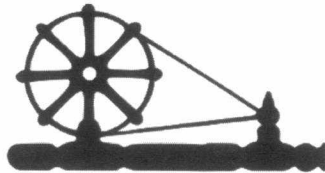

**Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the
Accounts of Gandhi Smriti & Darshan Samiti
for the year ended 31 March 2016**

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the Gandhi Smriti & Darshan Samiti (GSDS) as at 31 March 2016, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20 (1) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted up to 2018-19. These financial statements are the responsibility of the GSDS's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transaction with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

4. Based on our audit, we report that:

i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;

ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account/Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by the Ministry of Finance.

iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the GSDS in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.

iv. We further report that:

A Balance Sheet

A.1 Assets:

A.1.1 Fixed Assets (Schedule-8): Rs. 3.38 crore

A.1.1 An amount of Rs. 7.23 crore was released to CPWD for 'Up-gradation of Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti, Tees January Marg, New Delhi' during the year 2015-16. CPWD utilized Rs. 4.31 crore during the year and had unspent balance of Rs. 2.92 crore as on 31.03.2016. GSDS depicted Rs. 4.31 crore as revenue expenditure instead of increasing the fixed assets (buildings). This has resulted in understatement of fixed assets and overstatement of expenditure by Rs. 4.31 crore.

Further, GSDS had shown Rs. 2.92 crore as advance to CPWD instead of capitalized the amount under the head "work in progress". This has resulted in understatement of fixed assets (work-in-progress) and overstatement of current assets by Rs. 2.92 crore.

A.1.2 Current Assets, Loans, Advances etc (Schedule-11): Rs 8.11 crore

As per the Bank Reconciliation Statement of State Bank of India for the year 2015-16, cheques amounting to Rs. 0.38 lakh were shown as pending clearance pertaining to the period from December 2009 to December 2011. However, the bank balance was not reduced to that effect and it remained overstated by the like amount.

B. General:

B.1 Provisions for Audit fee and retirement benefits for the year 2015-16 was not made. Similarly Provisions for salary/allowances for the month of March 2016 was also not made in the accounts.

B.2 During 2015-16, GSDS invested the entire GPF accumulations of Rs. 183.38 lakh into term deposits, which was not in accordance with the pattern prescribed by the Ministry of Finance.

B.3 As per Schedule-10 of the Format of Accounts prescribed by the Ministry of Finance, each entity is to disclose the accounting policy in relation to investments both for long term & current investments. Audit noted that GSDS had kept huge balances in savings bank account maintained with Syndicate Bank Account No.-201/31268 and SBI Bank Account No. 10021675556, which yielded interest at the rate of 4% annually. Closing balances of every month are as under:

GSDS had no investment policy for the unspent balance lying in the bank account. In the absence of Short term FDRs, Swap Account, etc. for these balances, GSDS lost the opportunity to earn interest income over and above the saving bank interest being given by the bank.

C. Other Persistent Irregularities:

The following audit comment although featured in the previous year's report, the GSDS had not taken the remedial action:

C.1 In the annual accounts, Sale proceeds of books, journals and subscription amounting to Rs. 8.43 lakh was shown which included amount of subscription

of Rs. 3.55 lakh. However, as per the details provided to audit, subscription of Rs. 2.30 lakh only was received during the year 2014-15. Despite assurance given by GSDS, the difference in amount of subscription was not reconciled as yet.

- C.2 During 2014-15, an amount of Rs. 2.65 lakh was recovered from KVIC on account of property tax and was shown as negative expenditure under the head 'Other Administrative Expenses'.

Audit noted that GSDS had paid this amount on account of property tax in earlier years which was recovered from KVIC during 2014-15. Since the no debtors were shown in the previous years' account, it was shown as minus figure under the head 'Other Administrative Expenses'. This had resulted in understatement of expenditure by Rs. 2.65 lakh during 2014-15. Despite being pointed out by audit, the GSDS did not take any corrective measures.

- C.3 An amount of Rs. 0.23 lakh was depicted as TDS recoverable on the Asset side of the Balance Sheet. This amount was also shown in the last year's Balance sheet also. Audit noted that this amount pertained to TDS wrongly deducted by the Syndicate Bank. Despite being pointed out by audit, the GSDS could not recover this amount from the Bank.

- C.4 As per the format approved by the Ministry of Finance to be adopted by the autonomous bodies, the financial statements were to be prepared on the accrual method of accounting. However, GSDS was maintaining the accounts on cash basis except the GPF/CPF statements. The schedule numbers were also not in conformity with the approved format. The figures shown in the accounts were not rounded off as per the instructions contained in Uniform Format of Account.

D. Grants-in-aid:

The grants-in-aid received from M/o Culture and utilization thereof for the year 2015-16 are given below:

GSDS had unspent balance of Rs. 4.15 crore at the end of the financial year.

v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.

vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters

mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:

- a. In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Gandhi Smriti & Darashan Samiti March 2016; and
- b. In so far as it relates to Income and Expenditure Account of the surplus for the year ended on that date.
